19 No. She reports directly to the 20 board of commissioners.

21 Okay. Would you be able to stop a

22 firing, for lack of a better word, of an employee if you thought that the firing was 23

going to be unlawful if it was someone who was

an elected official such as the District

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1 who would have the power or the authority to 2 stop the District Attorney from firing somebody

3 who was hired via his 1620 powers if they

4 believed or if York County believed that the firing was going to be for an unlawful purpose?

5 6 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

THE DEPONENT: I don't know how to

8 answer that. I'm not aware -- I don't know. I 9

don't know the answer to that.

10 BY MR. JACOB:

11 You don't know if you're aware of

12 anybody with the authority?

13 Yeah. I don't know who would have 14 the authority to stop it.

15 Okay. I understand that. 16

MR. JACOB: I have nothing else.
