REPORTER'S NOTE: On-the-record Side Bar discussion held as follows:

MR. NESS: Elizabeth Ettinger was the landlady of Larry Hake during the months between January 12, 1982 and somewhere around February 18, 1982. Larry Hake lived in a summer house on the farm where Elizabeth lived and rented this summer house. Elizabeth talked to Jo Ellen Bailey after the first beating incident, and she will testify as to certain statements Jo Ellen made regarding this first incident.

MR. SMITH: What will the statements be?

MR. NESS: Something to the effect that the child had to be disciplined twice for wetting the bed. Subsequently -- they were friends -- subsequently, Jo Ellen Bailey came down and stayed for a number of days with the child, I think about four days, between January 12th and February 18th, in the summer house, with the child, with Hake.

Jo Ellen Bailey told Elizabeth Ettinger that if the authorities would ever contact her to lie and say that she had come down to visit the witness and had no contact with Hake.

She also took Jo Ellen Bailey up to the mobile home, or accompanied her to the Defendant's mobile home, when the child's father --

THE COURT: She took the Defendant to the Defendant's home?

MR. NESS: I think the Defendant was down at the farm with Hake. She took the Defendant back to her mobile home when the father's child was scheduled to come to York. The father was there with the child, and was kind and affectionate to the child — that's Cameron Bailey — and wanted the child to ride along with him to go to the airport when he was leaving to go back to his Military base. Now, Mr. Smith, in his argument, referred to the fact that the father was terrible to the child.

MR. SMITH: I didn't say terrible --

MR. NESS: In any event, Jo Ellea Bailey, in the presence of Elizabeth Ettinger, told the father that if Hake was there, Make would kill the father, imparting certain direction or control was a threat to the effect that, "Hake will kill you. All I have to do is tell him what to do." Something to that effect. The child started crying at that point, and the witness told Jo Ellen she should not talk in that fashion in front of the child.

THE COURT: Is that it?

MR. NESS: Yeah.
